## БЛОК І. ЧТЕНИЕ (30 баллов)

Task 1. Read the text below. For questions 1-5, choose the answer (a, b, c, d) which fits best according to the text. Put your answers on the answer sheet (10 points).

In the last two weeks, I have proofed, edited, revised, and advised several clients on their PowerPoint presentations. Every one of them has contained at least some of the same sort of errors. I have no fear that writing this article will reduce my workload, people being what they are, but it will be a convenient bookmark for me to pass on to clients who are already aware of my editing ways.

Avoid walls of text. Most people are painfully slow readers. If they say they read fast, there is a chance that's true, but what they are probably doing is skimming, not reading. If you could cut and paste your text slide as a blog post, it's a lousy slide. If you could cut and paste your text slide into Twitter, you're probably okay.

Show, don't tell. Don't give me a feature list. Give me a picture of something, with labels on it pointing out the features.

Each section is its own slide. I see a lot of slides with three or four subsections. Sorry, two sections on a slide is the max. Here's the secret - the longer you make people look at one single slide, no matter how fascinating it is, the longer they'll think they've been sitting in one place. They'll start to fidget, play with their phones and watch the clock. The more images that flip past them, the more engaged they'll be and the faster time will seem to fly. There's an upper limit to this, so don't bring an 80 slide presentation anywhere, but honestly, executives at pitch meetings have seen a billion slide shows. Their attention spans are quite small. Any slide requiring sustained focus is a bad slide. Professional trumps gimmicky. Please, save the fades and funny dissolves for your digital picture frame. If this is a pitch presentation, fun transitions won't help and might hurt.

But funny is okay. It is possible to be professional and funny. Wordplay, visual irony, injokes appropriate to your industry, and the like are okay - IF the person presenting the slides has the kind of personality that does funny well. If you are the person doing the presenting and forced to judge your own personality, think back to your performance at the office holiday party. If your jokes were not as good back then, cut the jokes in the presentation.

A. As evidence mounted against the president's staff, which included former staff members testifying against them in an investigation conducted by the Senate Watergate Committee, it was revealed in July 1973 that President Nixon had a tape-recording system in his offices and he had recorded many conversations.
B. Facing near-certain impeachment in the House of Representatives and a strong possibility of a conviction in the Senate, Nixon resigned the presidency on August 9, 1974. His successor, Gerald Ford, then issued a pardon to President Nixon.

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C. The affair began with the arrest of five men for breaking and entering into the Democratic National Committee (DNC) headquarters at the Watergate complex on June 17, 1972. The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) connected the payments to the burglars to a slush fund used by the Committee for the Re-Election of the President, a fundraising group for the Nixon campaign.
D. The Watergate scandal was a political scandal during the 1970s in the United States resulting from the June 1972 discovery of a break-in of the Democratic National Committee headquarters at the Watergate office complex in Washington, D.C., and the Nixon administration's attempted cover-up of its involvement. Effects of the scandal eventually led to the resignation of Richard Nixon, the President of the United States, on August 9, 1974; the only resignation of a U.S. President. The scandal also resulted in the indictment, trial, conviction and incarceration of 43 people, including dozens of top Nixon administration officials.
E. Recordings from these tapes implicated the president, revealing he had attempted to cover up the break-in. After a protracted series of bitter court battles, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the president had to hand over the tapes to government investigators; he ultimately complied.

1. However, after the discovery that one of the convicted burglars wrote to Judge Sirica suggesting there was a high-level coverup, the media shifted its focus.
2. The distrust between the press and the Nixon administration was mutual and greater than usual due to dissatisfaction with events from the Vietnam war.
3. Time Magazine, for example, described Nixon as undergoing "daily hell and very little trust".
4. During this early period, most of the media failed to grasp the full implications of the scandal, and concentrated reporting on other topics related to the 1972 Presidential election.
5. As for public distrust of the media, by the 1970s it had reached over $40 \%$.

When we say "bizarre," we're really thinking of festivals like the annual Bugfest at the North Carolina Museum of Natural Sciences. It's not only the festival's bug-filled fun for 2. $\qquad$ people of all ages that inspires us, but the "Cafe Insecta" featuring buggy-licious treats like stir-fry grasshoppers and mealworms marinara.

When you're ready to move up from bugs, slither on over to the Rattlesnake Hunt, held in Oklahoma, every April. If competing for the $\$ 150$ prize for longest snake caught makes you hungry the organizers will provide you with deep-fried rattlesnake meat.

No festival celebrates a single food object quite the way the Gilroy Garlic Festival does. The festival takes place in California, the 3. $\qquad$ "Garlic Capital of the World". This fragrant fest attracts more than 100,000 visitors annually who consume more than two and a half tons of garlic. While most of the focus is on 4. $\qquad$ uses, the unabashed love for garlic inspires some truly bizarre creations. Anyone hungry for garlic ice cream, garlic soft drinks and garlic lollipops?

Our second category includes foods that are regional or ethnic specialties. These include the Chitlin' Strut of Salley, South Carolina, and the San Fernando's Menudo Festival. Both celebrate parts of animals that most of us don't consider eating. (Chitlins, if you don't know, are pig intestines, and menudo is a traditional Mexican soup made of ox stomach.)

The well-known "recruitment" image was created by James Montgomery Flagg, an illustrator and portrait artist best known for commercial art.
